The chemical composition of Jojoba Oil means it has more in common with liquid wax esters than oil. The Jojoba bush flourishes in dry, arid conditions due to its ability to retain moisture. Benefits

The oil has a number of anti-inflammatory properties, keeping the skin soft, calm and comfortable. Origin

Jojoba's distinctive name is derived from Hohowi, the O'odham Native American tribe's word for seed. Originally fashioned into a paste used for skin care, Jojoba Oil found widespread use in the late 20th century as a replacement for whale oil in cosmetic formulations.
